World History: Human Origins and Ancient Civilizations

This year's topics focus on human origins and ancient civilizations around the world. The goal in social studies is to support the civic competence of the students through knowledge, critical thinking, and multiple perspectives. The program's content and terminology are based on Virginia's Standards of Learning (S.O.L.) and the National Council for the Social Studies Curriculum Standards.

By the end of the course, students will:

- Use historical and geographical analysis to explore the historical development of people, places, and patterns of life from prehistory and many ancient civilizations, empires, and cultures in terms of impact on the modern world, particularly Western Civilization.
- Understand the principal themes of history including: Continuity and Change, Culture, Production, Distribution, and Consumption, and Civic Ideals
- ☆ Interpret and apply data from original documents, including cartoons, graphs, letters, etc.
- ☆ Use historical data to support an argument or position
- \Rightarrow Effectively use analytical skills of evaluation, cause and effect, compare and contrast.
- ☆ Take notes from class lectures, peer presentations, and readings
- Present information in a variety of forms including posters, PowerPoint presentations, essays, research papers, oral presentations, dramatizations, traditional quizzes and tests, and other creative projects that will be evaluated
- \Rightarrow Recall and analyze course content for assessments
- \Rightarrow Work effectively with others to produce products and solve problems.
- \Rightarrow Understand how geography can shape history
- \Rightarrow Evaluate current events and connect them to historical themes

Written Assignments

Writing is a powerful form of communication. Writing standards help us better understand each other. All work should be completed in standard MLA format, as is consistent in the Middle School program.

Canvas

We will use Canvas as a repository for all class resources outside the textbook. Students will also have the option of turning in some assignments through Canvas if they choose. All work will be graded and returned in the format in which it is turned in and/or printed and placed into your portfolio. Groups may choose to use the features available in the Google Education Suite for project collaboration.

National History Day

Each student will complete a National History Day project. This begins as a research paper in September and will be transformed into a final project later in the year. This year's theme is *Rights and Responsibilities in History*. Every student is expected to create a History Day project, though they may choose whether or not to compete in the official competition.
